HeinOnline is the world's largest image-based legal research collection containing more than 9 centuries of legal history.

LEGAL RESOURCES FROM HEINONLINE

AVAILABLE AT THE STATE LIBRARY



The State Library recently began a subscription to HeinOnline, a major database of legal materials.

A research product with more than 90 million pages of legal history available in an online, fully-searchable, image-based format, HeinOnline bridges the gap in legal history. It does this by providing comprehensive coverage from inception of more than 1,700 law and law-related periodicals.

HeinOnline also provides access to the US Statutes-at-Large, the official source of laws and resolutions passed by Congress, back to 1789. A Legislative History Library for major federal laws, with bills, reports, hearings and other full text documents as well as the U.S. Code, Code of Federal Regulations, Federal Register (from its inception in 1936), treaties and international agreements, U.S. Reports, Canadian Supreme Court Reports, English Reports Full Reprint (1220-1867) and a collection of treatises considered legal classics are also included in the database.

Access to HeinOnline is available from any computer to state government employees and Thomas Edison State College students and staff with your library card barcode at <http://tinyurl.com/b87ys6a>. All others may use the database at the library.

STATE LIBRARY'S "PRIZED ARTIFACT" NOTED



One of the many prized items at the State Library is a book from the personal library of Lewis Morris, American colonial official, Chief Justice of New York and first royal governor of New Jersey. In 1738 Morris presented the book, *D'Ewes The Journals of All Parliaments During the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, Both of the House of Lords and House of Commons, London, 1682*, to the General Assembly. In doing so, he influenced the development of the Assembly's collection with this acquisition of a publication not of its own making.
